

# 1.0 Background

Through the Community Engagement Strategic Initiative (CE SI) the Global Fund seeks to strengthen the engagement of civil society and communities most affected by the three diseases in Global Fund and related processes through three mutually reinforcing components that include;

- 1. The provision of peer-to-peer community and civil society short-term technical assistance program
- 2. Provision of Long-term capacity development of organizations and networks of key and vulnerable populations
- 3. Ensuring regular and timely provision of relevant HIV, TB and Malaria information to communities through the regional platforms for communication and coordination supported through the CRG SI.

The CE SI supports the engagement of communities and civil society actors at all stages of the Global Fund grant life cycle is critical in the design, development and implementation of effective responses to the three diseases and system strengthening, ensuring that Global Fund investments evolve as responsive to those most impacted.

Given that one of the key roles that EANNASO plays is to enhance knowledge and improve meaningful engagement of communities through creating a space for learning and sharing, EANNASO will host an annual meeting for Civil society and Community groups to share experiences, best practices and take stock of what worked well in NFM3 to inform communities and CSOs preparation for NFM4.

The key highlight of the meeting will be to discuss strategies for strengthening the engagement of CS and CG on how to accelerate the implementation and absorption of funds in active NFM 3 grants and the upcoming NFM4 grant cycle.

Approximately 70 delegates including delegates drawn from civil society organizations, community-based organizations, KVP – led organizations and partners working towards HIV, TB and Malaria responses across 24 countries in Africa will participate. EANNASO will also invite delegates from technical

assistance providers, long-term capacity development organizations and networks of KVPs, technical partners (UNAIDS, BACKUP Health, Roll Back Malaria, PEPFAR) and the Global Fund (Community Engagement, Community Led Monitoring, TB division, Grant making division)

### 3.0 Workshop Objectives and Expected Outcomes

The three-day workshop will seek to achieve the following objectives:

- 1. Share lessons learned and good practices on successful engagement of communities in Global Fund country dialogue processes and in Global Fund grants currently being implemented under NFM 3 and C19RM to inform approaches to NFM4 funding request development.
- 2. Increase civil society and communities understanding and knowledge of: the new Global Fund strategy; key and emerging technical priorities; existing and new processes related to funding request development.
- 3. Maximize opportunities for the meaningful engagement of civil society and communities, identifying country technical assistance needs with a focus on supporting community, rights and gender interventions in national strategic plans and in Global Fund funding request.
- 4. Improve coordination among civil society and communities and facilitate cross country learning and sharing of implementation best practice

By the end of the three-day workshop, the participants will have:

- Shared and learned from NFM III and C19RM 2.0 grant implementation experiences to inform the upcoming 2023 -2025 allocation cycle
- Acquired knowledge of the new Global Fund strategy 2023-2025 and be tipped on how to use it to promote the Community, Rights and Gender Interventions in the 2023-2025 allocation cycle
- Been updated on the next funding cycle Global Fund Guidance related to Funding request development and funding instructions
- Acquired in-depth understanding of the Community Systems Strengthening and the activities for community led monitoring, community lead advocacy and research, institutional capacity building and social networking and mobilization,
- Prepared broad based country adaptable CRG priorities and TA plans to for the 2023 Funding Request development phase and plans for broader and inclusive community engagement at country level

The 3-day participatory workshop that will adopt a blend of approaches including but not limited to experience sharing, Q and A sessions, plenary presentation and discussions, PPT presentations, groups work and reporting sessions and panel presentations and discussions.
